This half term we will continue with the new homework system so you have more choice in how you do your homework. You will need to *choose three pieces from the 'menu' below to complete over the half term-one from each column. After you have completed each one, bring it back to school.*

The 'Peri-ometer' shows the difficulty or challenge the homework may offer. It can even be a photograph or drawing of something you have done. All your three pieces need to be done by February half term.

<b>English and Mathematics</b>	<b>Science - Electrical Circuits</b>	<b>Geography-Cities of the UK</b>
Create a questionnaire about a favourite topic, then display the results in 2 different forms of data (bar chart, pie chart etc)	Make a toy or game that uses a simple electrical circuit or batteries.	Design a journey map of London, showing how to get from one tourist attraction to another (you could show different forms of transport).
Write a poem about how life would be without flowers and plants to brighten the world.	Write an explanation of how an electrical circuit works, including one that uses additional parts, such as a fan or buzzer (include a diagram)	Draw a map of London, showing different tourist attractions.
Write a short story about an adventure involving the crown jewels/the Tower of London (as in 'Gangsta Granny')	Write a diary entry for an imaginary day when you have no electricity due to a power cut (explain what you did instead)	Make a poster to advertise a particular London tourist attraction (especially one that you may have visited).
Draw a picture of a dark and gloomy city, without any grass or flowers, as seen in the story 'The Promise'.	Design a poster to show items that use electricity in the home (can be battery or mains operated).	Draw a detailed image of a favourite London tourist attraction, such as Big Ben or the London Eye.
